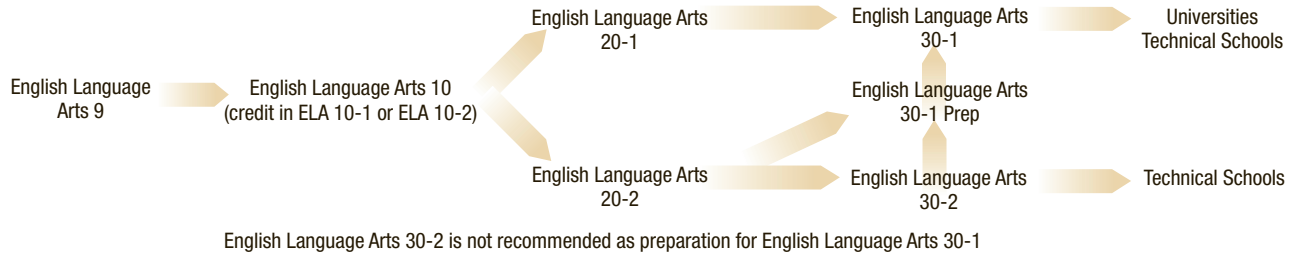

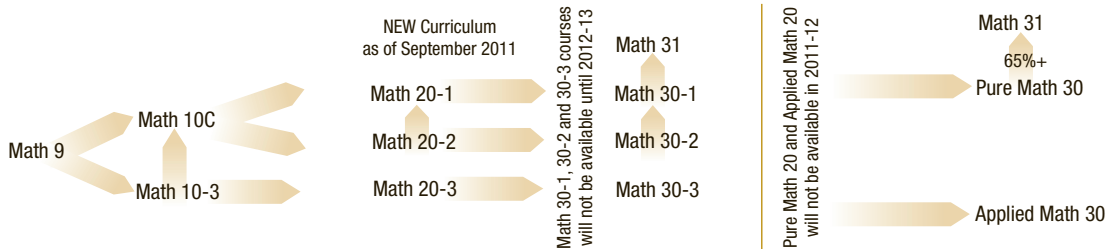

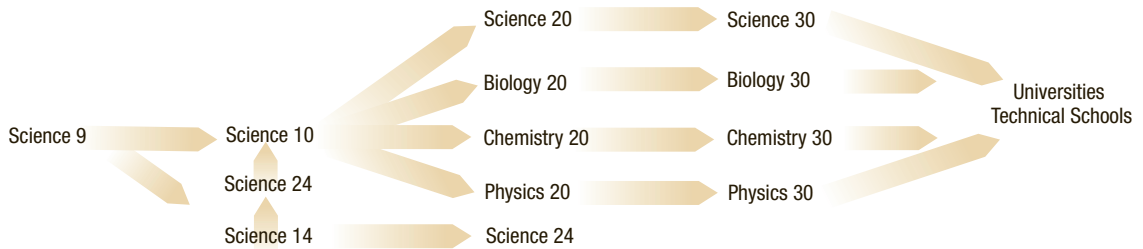

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS 10, 20-1, 30-1 • 5 CREDITS

Academic English: develop an understanding and appreciation of literature and an ability to use language effectively

English Language Arts 10

(Credit in ELA 10-1 or ELA 10-2)

Prerequisite: Grade 9 Language Arts

Students will decide, in consultation with teacher, to work toward credit in ELA 10-1 or ELA 10-2

English Language Arts 20-1

Prerequisite: ELA 10-1

English Language Arts 30-1 Prep • 5 credits

(Credit in ELA 20-1)

Prerequisite: ELA 10-1

Preparation for success in ELA 30-1. For students who minimally passed ELA 20-1 or who have ELA 30-2; includes diploma exam preparation for mature students challenging ELA 30-1

English Language Arts 30-1A • 5 credits

English Language Arts 30-1 Reboot - Diploma Exam Prep

Reboot your exam mark! Learn how to write an effective critical essay and personal response. Students will be given concrete, specific instruction in multiple choice reading in this 40 hour class

This course is not a replacement for ELA 30-1; it will focus only on the diploma exam and is intended for students who had a class mark of 65% or greater

-1 Course Sequence

This course sequence is designed to provide students with the mathematical understandings and critical-thinking skills identified for entry into post-secondary programs that require the study of calculus. Topics include algebra and numbers, measurement, relations and functions, trigonometry, and permutations, combinations and binomial theorem

-2 Course Sequence

This course sequence is designed to provide students with the mathematical understandings and critical-thinking skills identified for post-secondary studies in programs that do not require the study of calculus. Topics include geometry, measurement, logic and numbers, logical reasoning, relations and functions, and statistics and probability

-3 Course Sequence

This course sequence is designed to provide students with the mathematical understandings and critical-thinking skills identified for entry into the majority of trades and for direct entry into the work force. Topics include algebra, geometry, measurement, numbers, statistics and probability

Mathematics 10C • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Grade 9 Math, Mathematics 10 Prep

All students start at this level. Students passing this course move on to either Mathematics 20-1 or 20-2. Topics include measurement, trigonometry, polynomials, number sense, exponents, and linear functions and equations

Mathematics 10-3 • 5 credits

Intended for students interested in trades or direct entry into the workforce. Students passing this course can move onto Mathematics 10C or Mathematics 20-3

Topics include measurement, trigonometry, finance, and geometry

Mathematics 20-1

Prerequisite: Math 10C (65%+ recommended)

Mathematics 20-2 • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Math 10C

Mathematics 20-3 • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Math 10C or Math 10-3

Pure Mathematics 30 • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Math 20-1, Pure Math 20 or Pure Math 30 Bridging (65%+ recommended)

Condensed Pure Mathematics 30 • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Math 20-1 Pure Math 20 or Pure Math 30 Bridging (65%+ recommended)

Applied Mathematics 30 • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Math 20-2 or Applied Math 20

Mathematics 31 • 5 credits

Prerequisite: Pure Math 30 (65% + recommended)

This is a highly advanced course designed for students entering post-secondary programs that recommend or stipulate calculus as an entrance requirement. It is desirable that students complete Pure Math 30 before taking Math 31

Topics include precalculus and limits, derivatives and derivative theorems, application of derivatives, integrals, integral theorems, and integral applications

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 10-20-30 • 5 CREDITS

Activity based course that promotes individual fitness

SCIENCE 14-24 • 5 CREDITS

General science courses: lab activities and influence of science on society

Science 14

Investigating properties of matter; matter and energy in living systems; and in the environment. Understanding energy transfer technologies

Science 24

Prerequisite: Science 14 or equivalent

Completes high school science diploma requirement. May be used as preparation for Science 10

Applications of matter and chemical change; understanding common energy conversion systems; disease defence and human health; and motion, change and transportation safety

SCIENCE 10-20-30 • 5 CREDITS

Integrated academic science courses: topics from biology, chemistry, applied physics and other disciplines

Science 10

Prerequisite: Grade 9 Science or Science 24

Energy and matter in chemical change; energy flow in technological systems; cycling of matter in living systems; and energy flow in global systems

Science 20

Chemical changes; changes in motion; the changing earth; and changes in living systems

Science 30

Living systems respond to their environment; chemistry and the environment; electromagnetic energy; and energy and the environment

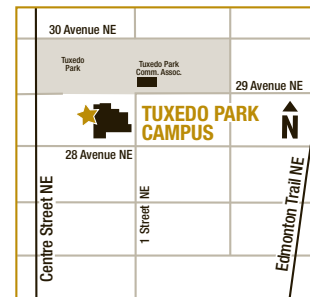
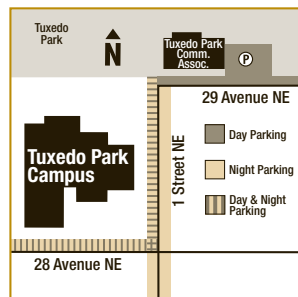

- the holder of a previously awarded high school diploma from the province of Alberta or an equivalent high school diploma from a jurisdiction acceptable to the Minister of Education

I am a mature student and want to write a diploma exam. How will my mark be calculated?

For students with mature student status, the final mark is determined by either the blended mark (school-awarded mark plus Grade 12 Provincial Diploma Exam mark) or the Provincial Diploma Exam mark only, depending on which is the highest mark.

I am currently attending high school, can I still register for a course at Chinook Learning Services?

Yes, but only if you provide a completed Prerequisite Information Form from your high school counsellor at the time of registration. You should also know that Alberta Education funding does not allow students to register in the same course at two schools in the same semester.

I'm under 20 years of age and not currently attending high school but would like to register at Chinook Learning Services. What do I need to do first?

If you were under 20 years of age as of September 1, 2011, you are required to meet with a Student Services Advisor to discuss your program prior to registering. Call 403-777-7200 (Option 4). Please bring a copy of your high school records to your appointment.

I want to rewrite a diploma exam. What do I do?

Application forms are available at the Information Centre or Student Services, at VBC Campus. Alberta Education charges a fee of \$26.25 per exam you rewrite.

How can I obtain my high school records?

- If you have completed high school courses in Alberta, a statement of marks can be requested electronically through Alberta Education's website: www.education.alberta.ca/students/transcripts.aspx
- If you attended high school in another province, please contact that province to obtain your high school records

I have my out-of-province high school records and would like to take courses at Chinook Learning Services. How do I know which courses to take in Alberta?

Our Student Services Advisors will assist you with the appropriate course placement. Please call 403-777-7200 (Option 4). Please bring a copy of your high school records to your appointment.

I am 20 years of age (or older) and need to complete my high school program. Do I need to discuss my course choices with anyone?

We would recommend that you make an appointment to discuss your choices with an advisor to make sure you are appropriately placed. English and Mathematics assessments are available to help you with these decisions. Please call 403-777-7200 (Option 4) for more information.

I need a high school diploma. Are there alternatives?
